Who We Are


The only all states advocacy group focused solely on intercity passenger rail.

History

- The States for Passenger Rail Coalition (SPRC) was formed in 2001 by Terry Mulcahy, Secretary of Transportation, Wisconsin DOT, and state DOTs across the US to:
 - Organize as a coalition of states focused solely on intercity passenger rail;
 - Advocate for legislation and policies to advance intercity passenger rail in the US;
 - Act quickly and speak with one voice in developing and/or responding to legislation/policies affecting intercity passenger rail in the US.

2000 Annual Report

1. Mission and membership

States for Passenger Rail is a coalition of state departments of transportation to advocate for federal funding and to support intercity passenger rail initiatives.

- The coalition in 2000 had nineteen members: Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, and Wisconsin.
- At least twelve other states were considering membership, or participated in meetings and information sharing.
- The Wisconsin Department of Transportation initiated the concept for the coalition at a national summit on high speed rail in October of 1999. In early 2000, the coalition formed, with each state member assigning a delegate to a coalition Steering Committee.

Section 209 of PRIIA (2008)

Directed states to assume responsibility for the operating and capital expenses associated with their routes—using a standard, nationwide methodology.

STB Decision (2012)

First year of operating and capital payments (2013)


FAST Act (2015)

- 1. Established "state-supported route committee" (SAIPRC)
- 2. Directed the committee to
 - a) Oversee implementation of the PRIIA 209 Methodology
 - b) Foster collaboration among Amtrak, the states and FRA
- 3. Authorized funding for committee

Under PRIIA 209, each year states typically contribute **over \$800m** to Amtrak in ticket revenue and direct state payments.




Committee Structure

1. Costing

- Covers <u>all</u> modes: Aviation, Rail, Highways, Transit, Water, and Active Transportation






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AASHTO Committee Structure








NGEC Origins

§ 305 of the Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (PRIIA)

- Amtrak was required to establish the Next Generation Corridor Equipment Pool Committee
- Per statute, membership is comprised of representatives from:
 - Amtrak,
 - Federal Railroad Administration,
 - Interested States (Current Membership: CA, CT, IA, IL, ME, MO, NC, NY, OR, WA, WI),
 - Host freight railroad companies,
 - Railroad equipment manufacturers & suppliers (currently over 200 industry members),
 - Other passenger railroad operators
- The Committee was formed to design, develop specifications for, and procure standardized next-generation corridor equipment.
- Revitalization of the American Passenger Railcar Manufacturing Industry.


